VOICES FROM THE MEN'S GROUP

I'm not a machine, though and I don't want to be a machine. I'm a numan being, with all the awesome fraility and possibility implicit in that.

There is more to any individual human being than can be cap ured in the simple sex role prisons of male/female, boy/girl. It as long been plainly and painfully obvious to me that the female: half of our human species has been obliterated, wounded, ignored, crushed, raped, trivialized, and OPPRESSED Just about everywhere harmon creatures have walked. The abuse of those who make up Just over 1/2 of the human race is an outrageous crime and must be lought on all levels by all means necessary. How I, as a man, was being deadened, desensitized, dehumanized and destroyed, however, did not become clear to me till later--ironically, as a result of ferrinism.

I take feminism's critique of men not as a threat, but as hope for myself as a man, chained within an inhuman, violent, de aumanizing upbringing. But even though feminism offers hope to men it also demands action. All men need to take on a two-fold challenge: (#1, to take responsibility to change ourselves, to help stop male violence against women and to support women in their sur iggle against sexism and (#2, to defy male conditioning for ourselves so that we can be human beings capable of love, tenderness, and true expression, not deadly desensitized weapons or labor machines killing ourselves, others and our Earth to succeed as "real iner".

This is not an idle intellectual question--for me, 't is life and death. I hope that I will have the courage to continue to confront myself, to accept criticism, to stay alive and growing. Noone can do this alone. I find encouragement and inspiration from many sources, including the other men in our group and the girls/women in Riot Gerel. I hope, in turn, to encourage other men to shed their chains/privileges and work together w/ our enhalted sisters to make our lives and our world all that they can be

MEN can stop RAPE

(a. lew tips for men on low to start)

**Don't laugh at jokes that make light of rape, harassment or other belittling of women or their concerns. This helps to build the social context within which rape becomes acceptable. If necessary, calmly confront the man who is making the joke, explaining why you do not find it funny and saying that you wish he would not talk that way.


***Don't support magazines, movies, language or music that objectifies or demeans women. Anything, from pornography to MTV to advertising that makes women seem less-than-human or makes them into a product to be consumed contributes to the psychic numbing that makes rape possible. The same process of "deh imanizing the enemy/desensitizing the soldier" that goes on in war goes on everyday, especially for men who often have not been brought to be deeply sensitive creatures in the first place. Men need to see women as they really are--not as the "other", an "enemy" or a "product" but as thinking, feeling human beings.

**Give support and acceptance to a woman/girl who says she has been raped. Listen to them and believe them. Though there are women who have lied about attacks, there are far more who have faced the double penalty of the attack itself and then the disbelief of those who she confides in--truly adding insult to injury.

**Don't blame a woman for being raped. Often our society blames the victim for their plight--"the poor are lazy", etc.--but we must see beyond this. Women do not ask to be raped. They should have the right to walk wherever they want, to say whatever they want, to wear whatever they want, without being raped. Rape is not a sexual act, it is an act of violence and domination. Men must be held responsible for their actions. Nothing justifies the crime of rape.

**Educate yourself about rape and support the efforts by women in your life to educate themselves or take self-defense or otherwise protect themselves aginst assault. You have not been put on earth to be women's protector. Remember that you are simply trying to take responsibility for your own actions and those of other men. Nomen are also acting for themselves. Let them. Support, don't patronize.

**Be aware of how your presence as a man affects women on the street or elsewhere. Sad to say, in our society, a woman has every reason to be suspicious of men, especially unfamiliar men in public situations. For example, it is advisable if you find yourself walking behind a woman on a lonely street at night to cross to the other side of the street. Don't be offended that a woman might be suspicious of you. Rather sympathize with her plight--after all, you as a man have not had to live your whole life in fear of physical assault.



**Demand that the police and courts take rape seriously as a violent crime. Insist that sufficient funding is given to public and private agencies that deal with rape prevention and counseling. Demand that the legal system put the accused rapist and not the victim or trial. Rape is one of the most underreported crimes—mostly because of the social stigma attached to it and the agony inflicted upon the victim by the courts, police, etc. Many authorities pay I preservice to such concerns—it's your job to see that they do more.

**Tho this may sound strange, perhaps the most important thing you can as a man do is to not rape. This means learning to communicate openly and honestly about your desires, and insisting on that from your partner(s). It means learning to take "no" for an answer and not assuming that "no" means "maybe". Learn to communicate your feelings without violence or its threat. This may mean avoiding sex with anyone who is drunk or chemically impaired or too young or who otherwise may be vulnerable to you. A large proportion of rapes take place between acquaintances. Sex must be explicitly and mutually agreed upon, free of undue pressure, or it is rape.

**Support and, if possible, join groups such as DC Men Against Rape who explicitly seek to encourage men to take their reponsibility to help end rape. Almost without exception, it is men who rape--her ce we must bear a special responsibility to help end it. Women today face an undeclared war against them. If you're a man who opposes violence against women, it's time to act--words are not enough.












Traditional male training has created men who rape and batter women, sexually abuse children, and are violent toward other men. A Quiz to Test Sex Bias in Adults

At the Principal Effectiveness, Pupil Achievement workshop in August, the Sadkers told participants that the sex bias they found in their classroom research continues into adulthood. To illustrate this problem, they split the 31 participants into five groups, gave everyone five questions from a questionnaire devised from research conducted in classrooms, private homes, offices and hospitals, and asked each group to come to a consensus on each question. The items should be marked true or false; see how your answers compare with those of area school principals:

1. Men talk more than women.

2. When people hear generic words such as "mankind" and "he,"

they respond inclusively, indicating that the terms apply to both sexes.

- 3. Women are more likely to touch others than men are.
- 4. Women use less personal space than men.
- 5. In general, women speak in a more tentative style than do men.

ANSWERS

- 1. Although four out of the five groups said wemen are more talkative than men, research indicates the opposite. In one study, people were asked to describe an engraving. On average, the men talked about it for 13 minutes; the women for three minutes.
- 2. Two groups came up with the correct answer here—false. In the

minds of most people, words like "mankind" and "he" are not generic.

- 3. Women are no more likely than men to touch people. Only one group got this one wrong.
- 4. Every group at the workshop said women use more space because of the many belongings they carry. Every group was wrong—researchers found that women hold themselves into a tight space. Men tend to spread out.
- 5. This one was easy for the educators—every group said this statement is true, and in fact it is. An example is women's tendency to ask others if they are cold. Men will declare outright that it is cold.

Why Do Boys Score Higher?

Researchers Say They Get More Attention

When Sue Randall was in school she thought the boys had all the brains, even though she was at the top of her class.

"I used to get better grades than the boys, but I remember thinking how intelligent those boys were. They were always doing things. I don't remember a teacher telling me what I did well. I knew what the boys did well," recalled Randall, now a special education teacher at Arlington's Thomas Jefferson Junior High School.

"I didn't have one special thing. That's how you build your self-esteem, when you can say what you do well."

Randall's experience is a common one. Two studies by American University education professors Myra and David Sadker showed that boys get far more attention—be it praise or criticism—from their teachers. When girls do attract a teacher's notice, it's often for their neat handwriting or exemplary behavior, not for their adroitness at algebra)

The first of the Sadkers' studies, conducted between 1980 and 1984 with a grant from the National Institute of Education, looked at more than 100 fourth, sixth and eighth-grade classrooms in four states and the District of Columbia, representing students from various ethnic and economic backgrounds. In 1984, the Sadkers began a two-year study of classrooms at American University, financed by the Fund for the Improvement of Post-Secondary Education, which led them to conclude that sex bias is far worse in college than in grammar school. "The news is not that there was bias" at American, said Myra Sadker, "but that they were able to achieve equity. Professors can change and want to—they just need training like anyone else."

At all grade levels, "what our research shows is that education is not a spectator sport," said David Sadker. "Students achieve the most when they're actively involved.

"When girls come into school, they are ahead of boys in reading and math and writing. When they leave school at the end of the 12th grade . . boys are outscoring them. On the SAT [Scholastic Aptitude Test], not only are boys 50 points ahead on math, but for the last decade, they've been ahead on the verbal. Girls are the only group that leave school performing worse."

In their secondary-school study, the Sadkers found that boys dominate in all subject areas, not just science and math. And their domination grows as they get older.

In their classroom studies, the Sadkers looked at each interaction between teacher and student, categorizing the teacher's response as:

- Criticism. On average, this category comprised 5 percent of teacher responses.
- Acceptance. When the teacher says simply "okay" or "uh huh"—this is the most common response, turning up 53 percent of the time, more than all other types combined.
- Remediation. When a child gives a wrong answer, the teacher, 33 percent of the time, tells him or her to "keep trying" or gives a hint to help him find the answer.
- Praise. The Sadkers found that 10 percent of teacher responses were praise. This includes times when a teacher says "okay," but in a very positive tone of voice.

Whether they were visiting a school

in the District, Patryland, Virginia, Connecticut or Massachusetts, whether the school was pie for inately black or white, the Sadkers found that white boys received the most attention from teachers, followed by in nority boys, white girls and minority girls. That pattern was not affected by the race or sex of the teacher.

And it isn't just teachers who promulgate bias in the classifform—teaching materials also prompte boys at the expense of girls. The Budkers spoke to teachers who had been taught to choose books with a male perspective, on the assumption that girls would be interested in books about boys, but boys would never sit still for a book about a girl. A study of books that have won the Caldecett. Medal, the Pulitzer of the kiddit set, shows that, for every girl depicted in the books, there are 10 boys.

As the Sadkers demonstrate in their workshops and presentations, classroom observers do not see blatant sexism or racism. It is more a matter of who is being ignored. What's more, this displicity often results from the fac: Illat girls are better behaved train boys, who, on average, call out a sivery without raising their hands eight times more often The two-day workshop began, as many of the Sadde's' programs do, with a videotape tial is shown to college education majors as an example of good teaching. The first time they saw the cape about two-thirds of the participants detected some bias, but didn't think it was a pig problem.

But later in the works top, when the principals, armed with score sheets, saw the film again, the balance tipped toward heavy bias. Facticipants noticed that the teacher in the film asked the two white boys more challenging questions and praised their correct answers or coaxed the nalong toward the right answer. The white girl's answers met a simple "okay," while the Hispanic girl sitting next to the teacher was almost guered.

The Sadkers' pie nise, that children who receive the nost attention will perform the best, is so basic that some educators have a hard time laying so much of the blame for girls' worsening test scores on bias. Several principals at the workshop voiced the opinion that "I made in hrough school without this [equity training] and I turned out fine."


